SC High Begins Random Drug Testing of Students

I sat down with high school principal, Mike Johnson, and asked him a few questions about the new drug testing policy in the high school. The first drug test was conducted on August 26th. The administration thought that the drug testing might help students to say no in order to stay involved in a club or sport. It also makes the student think of another factor. Instead of making a selfish decision, they might think about their teammates. The first drug test started small with just ten students. Mr. Johnson uses a rolling of the dice system with a witness to select the students at random. One of the questions I asked was what the penalties were for testing positive. He clarified that if students did test positive that they wouldn't be turned in to the police, but would be suspended for 15 days from the activity or sport they participate in and that the office would notify the coaches, sponsors, and parents. 
